From the Field



I will vote! Will you?

Yes, it is already time to start thinking about the election this fall. Why? Well, early voting starts September 21, just a few weeks in to the 2018-19 school year. Because of this, Education Minnesota has been hard at work getting ready for this election. Goals we have include increasing member participation and more trans-

parency in the endorsement process for all **KEVIN YOUNG** candidates. New this year is the requirement all candidates for governor complete a five-step process to earn 2018 Education Minnesota gubernatorial endorsement. These are: 1) Participate in the public candidate forum at the Education Minnesota Political Conference. 2) Spend a full- or half-day shadowing educators at work. 3) Engage in a pocketbook and community issues roundtable conversation with educators. 4) Complete a candidate questionnaire that will be shared publicly. 5) Participate in a screening interview with the Education Minnesota PAC board. Education Minnesota members will also be screening and endorsing other candidates running for political office. Please be ready for communications that will come from our office regarding the need for members to help screen candidates. Screening will most-likely take place in late May and June, after the legislative session has come to a close.

It is never too early for you to identify and engage fellow members to get involved in the political process. We are looking for volunteers from ALL of our locals to work on "get out the vote" campaigns. In 2014, the last non-presidential election, approximately 33,000 of Education Minnesota's members did not vote. We need your help in developing a local plan that will encourage all of our members to vote. The idea is to develop a local plan this spring so it will be ready to be put into action when everyone returns to workshops in the fall. As mentioned earlier, Education Minnesota will continue to endorse candidates, but the focus this year will be to get all members to the polls. If you would like to be on your local team to help make this happen, please let me know.

Another way to get involved is to participate in the Political Refund Contribution Program. This program allows any resident of Minnesota to make a contribution to any candidate and be reimbursed up to \$50.00 for singles and \$100.00 for married couples. <u>www.cfboard.state.mn.us/publicsubsidy/conrefund.htm</u>. This is a great way to support your candidate and get involved in the political process.

Education Minnesota would also like to know if there are any local levy campaigns or school board races your local would like supported. We can help you in the process of passing a levy or endorsing various school board candidates. Please do not hesitate to let me know if you have any such local races. We want to help.

We continually hear, Elections Matter. Well, it is true. It is time to think about the future. Like it or not, politics rule our public education world. We need to take an active role in the process. Please get involved. The most important thing you can do is vote. That may seem like common sense, but we cannot afford to have 33,000 Education Minnesota members not vote in the 2018 election. Getting good results from elections is one of the most important things your union does to ensure that public education thrives in Minnesota. The real work of getting education friendly candidates elected comes from engaging ALL of you. It is time to stand up for public education just as your colleagues in West Virginia, Arizona, and Oklahoma have the past few months. If you don't, who will? The future of our profession is always in the hands of politicians. I hope you will join me in voting this fall and encouraging all members to vote in 2018. Training available to help teachers understand new teacher licensure system

The 2017 Minnesota legislative session brought major changes to the state's teacher licensure system and the governance of that system.

The new law reflects a dramatic departure from Minnesota's long-standing commitment to high standards for teacher licensure. The changes include a complete revision of the licensure structure for teachers, as well as a new governing board.

The training will also discuss the new Professional Educator Licensing and Standards Board (PELSB), which is now in place and which takes over all of the duties previously assumed by both the Minnesota Department of Education's licensing division and the Board of Teaching.

To help navigate the changes and what they mean for educators across the state, Education Minnesota has developed a number of trainings that are available through our Minnesota Educator Academy's professional development opportunities.

The "Teacher Licensure Update" training provides an overview of the new tiered licensure system, who qualifies for each tier, the renewal structure for each tier and the license limitations.

The "Pink Slip Process: Bargaining Layoff Language and Discussing the Divide Around Seniority" training is designed to equip negotiations team members with the information and understanding they will need to negotiate contract language related to the new tiered system.

Finally, a 10-minute meeting on the new tiered system and its implications will be rolled out in the coming months.

Janus v. AFSCME is a lawsuit filed by Mark Janus, an Illinois state employee. The suit challenges the authority of AFSCME and other public-sector employee unions to collect fair-share fees from all employees they represent. *Janus* was heard by the court Feb. 26 and a decision is expected by June 2018.

If the plaintiffs prevail, fees for non-members would no longer be mandatory. The fair-share fee represents the portion of union spending that is related to collective bargaining and enforcing a collective employment agreement covering everyone in a bargaining unit.

Election 2018 work heats up with local worksite action leaders

Education Minnesota members across the state are beginning work on the 2018 campaign.

A new piece of the union's campaign plan includes training and activating members as worksite action leaders.

A core reason why this new approach is taking place -- We are the only ones who can change this. No one can do it for us, or will do it for us. There are two kinds of power: organized money and organized people. We are the organized people.

There are some numbers that illuminate strategic opportunities and challenges in the 2018 election:

- 8,770 Margin of victory for Gov. Dayton in 2010
- 33,000 Education Minnesota members who skip voting in midterm elections
- 145,000 The margin of votes in a generic pro-union vs. anti-union statewide election. To safely elect a pro-union governor, 145,000 Minnesotans who did not vote in 2014 need to vote in 2018.
- 1,206 Worksites and campuses in Minnesota with at least 10 members who did not vote in 2014.

Education Minnesota is focusing its campaign plan on member engagement and outreach at the building level. That is where the worksite political action leaders come in.

Research shows that members who didn't vote or weren't active have not been motivated by our traditional campaign tactics like mailing and phone calls.

Worksite action leaders will relate to their colleagues and cut through the stereotypical campaign "noise," as well as help to make the campaign about real issues that will improve educators' work and home lives.





Collaboration lab brings professional development opportunities to districts

The Education Minnesota Foundation for Excellence in Teaching and Learning now offers professional development opportunities for school districts and their staff.

The single-day professional development or collaborative meetings will focus on racial equity or relationship building around Teacher Development and Evaluation or specific building issues.

Research has shown that a collaboration between staff and management positively impacts student achievement.

The foundation will work with a district's administration and staff to build positive relationships between staff and management to:

- Create systems and structures that support collaboration, deepen understanding of stakeholders and provide honest feedback that can lead to better outcomes for a specific project.
- Support sustainability of these systems and structures so that there is collaboration that takes place regardless of personalities of specific individuals in leadership.
- Reach positive outcomes on a shared goal, project or objective.

Districts will be charged a \$1,000 base partnership fee that will be a charitable donation to the foundation. This fee will get districts:

- Facilitation at four meetings for one yearlong project, including all of the tools for collaboration to make that project; OR
- One full professional development day including all trainers; OR
- Two half-day professional development sessions including all trainers.
- Staff and management are required to participate in and agree to all professional development, collaboration or goals that are worked on by the foundation.

Warren/Alvarado/Oslo Students Explore the World through Google Expeditions

So, would you like to take your students on a field trip to Greece or have them float through outer space? How about a trip to experience an art gallery or explore the Great Barrier Reef? Might there be some budget constraints and safe-ty issues involved? You CAN take your kids on over 500 different expeditions without ever leaving your classroom by using virtual reality through Google Expeditions. This tool allows teachers to extend the learning beyond the class-room walls. Last fall WAO elementary teachers Ashley Vongroven and Stacy Hanson purchased a Google Expeditions kit through grant money from the WAO Education Foundation. The kit included a tablet and mobile phones installed with the Google Expeditions app, 20 VR viewers, a router, chargers, and a storage case. Since then, WAO students in both the elementary and high school have been traveling the world, punctuated by the oohs and aahs of those experiencing virtual reality.



Last week, Kevin Longtin, science teacher at WAO, took his eighth graders to the bottom of the ocean. The tablet allows the teacher to mark whatever the teach-

er wants the students to see within their screen, and then the teacher can read information about what they are looking at or adapt it to the curriculum the teacher is using. On the day I observed it being used, the usually rowdy eighth graders were absolutely glued to their seats and pointing at things (in midair) that they were seeing. This was the first time Mr. Longtin had used the kit, and he was amazed at the ease of use and the positive response of his students. "I'll be using this quite often because it's so cool," he exclaimed. He said there were several options he could have chosen under the topic of ocean. Currently there are over 500 expeditions available with more being added every day.

Charity Gilbert, a WAO reading recovery teacher working with a small group kindergarten students, went on an underwater excursion this week where the students saw a whale shark, green turtles, dolphins, sharks, shipwrecks, and more. Using the experience as a writing prompt, they would look at a scene and then write about what they saw. She laughed as she described the students trying to touch the sea life by reaching out their hands in the air or rubbing the carpeting. Students were overheard exclaiming, "I don't want to fall in!" and "This is so cool." They absolutely loved the experience.



The kit is stored in the elementary library where librarian Sheryl Schanil wipes them down and recharges them after every use. She commented to me that when she uses virtual reality during library time, the students are thrilled and it adds so much to a lesson. She said, "Last night I asked a third graders what she liked about Google Expeditions. She said she has always wanted to go to Washington, DC. As she talked about seeing the White House grounds as well as inside of it, she broke into a huge smile, even though it was several months ago we took the trip via Google Expeditions. Many students have not had opportunities to travel so this gives them a view of a world much bigger than what they are familiar with." Whether it is a high school art class or a fourth grade history class, Google Expeditions brings the textbook and lesson plans alive through virtual reality. "With students being surrounded by technology outside of school, it is a way to speak their language as we teach them about geography, history, science, anatomy and more," explained Sheryl. It's been a wonderful addition to our district, thanks to the WAO Education Foundation support.

Our district is so lucky to have lots of technology opportunities for kids. Our robotics team will be competing at the Vex Robotics World Competition in Louisville, Kentucky, on April 25-28, 2018. Only nine teams out of the over 300 that started competition in the state of Minnesota will compete in Louisville; WAO will be one of those nine, thanks to funding from the Education Foundation and our community. We are so proud of our team and its coach, Nate Wozniak, who teaches industrial technology at WAO.



Frequently asked questions about pensions, their purpose, future

Two members of the Teacher Retirement Association Board of Trustees recently answered some of the frequently asked questions about pensions in the April issue of the Minnesota Educator newspaper. Here are a few of the questions. 
What is a pension?

A pension is a regular payment made during one's retirement. While working, employers and employees contribute to the retirement fund, the Teachers Retirement Association (TRA). In Minnesota, the State Board of Investment takes those contributions and invests them in the market. The result is that 73 percent of fund revenue comes from investment income, while just 27 percent comes from direct contributions. The fund then pays out that revenue in the form of monthly retirement checks.

Why is a pension an important benefit? How does it help with recruitment and retention, especially when our state is facing a teacher shortage?

TRA is the best benefit no one thinks about. Early in our careers, our focus is on learning the craft of teaching and doing our absolute best for our students. As our careers continue, the value of our TRA benefit emerges. Less than 50 percent of private sector employees have any pension at all. As TRA members, we have the security of a guaranteed pension, paid monthly, for the rest of our lives. No teacher should ever have to worry about how to make ends meet in retirement, and the TRA defined benefit pension helps our members retire with dignity.

It's a fact that teacher salaries are much lower when compared with other careers requiring advanced degrees. We also know that teaching is a highly stressful job. Our pension provides a tangible, guaranteed, future benefit, and that helps attract and keep high-quality teachers in the profession.



Resources available to help explain Janus case

Janus v. AFSCME is a lawsuit filed by Mark Janus, an Illinois state employee. The suit challenges the authority of AFSCME and other public-sector employee unions to collect fair-share fees from all employees they represent.

The U.S. Supreme Court has heard the case in its current session, with a decision expected between April and June 2018. If decided in Janus' favor, the case would make the entire public sector "right-to-work" in one fell swoop.

Education Minnesota has developed resources, including a backgrounder, talking points and comparison graphics, to help members not only talk about what the *Janus* case is and what it means, but also what the affects of similar cases and legislation have had on other states and unions.








504 Plans

I have taught special education for 28 years, and have frequently been asked about 504 Plans. I am going to try and answer some common questions regarding what a 504 Plan is, and what it isn't. A 504 Plan is quite different than an IEP in many ways, but the goal is really the same. The purpose of 504 Plans and IEPs is to ensure that students with disabilities have access to a free and appropriate public education (FAPE). This education must be comparable to children who do not have a disability. Students who are eligible for special education services are covered by the federal law, Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA). Under this federal law, a student is eligible to receive special education and/or related services if he/she meets criteria for a disability. What about students who do not meet the criteria described by IDEA? These students may qualify for assistance through the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 under Section 504. This act states that no one with a disability can be excluded from participating in federally funded programs or activities in elementary, secondary, and post-secondary school settings. A 504 plan is intended for children who are able to learn at a typical level of their classmates, with appropriate accommodations in the general education curriculum.

What does a 504 Plan include? It describes specific accommodations that will be needed for a child to have the opportunity to perform at the same level as their non-disabled peers. What are some common examples of these accommodations? Some examples are: a quiet place to work, extended time for tests, wheelchair ramp, blood sugar monitoring, preferential seating in the classroom, an extra set of textbooks at home, a keyboard for notetaking, or an allergen-free environment. A 504 Plan may include one accommodation or be much more extensive. Children do not need a full evaluation to qualify for a 504 Plan, although many do. In

fact, schools often suggest a 504 Plan if the student does not qualify for an IEP. It is also common for parents to request a 504 Plan for their child if he/she doesn't meet special education criteria. Unlike an IEP, 504 Plans are not a legal document and do not include formal goals and objectives, benchmarks, or measurement. There is no standard form for 504 Plans, in fact there isn't even a requirement that the plan be written. An individual school district develops its own plans for students who qualify for a 504 Plan. Every school district has its own procedures in place for implementing Section 504.

What are the two requirements necessary to place a child on a 504 Plan? First of all, a child must have a documented disability which can include a variety of learning or attention issues. Secondly, the disability must interfere with the child's ability to learn in the general education classroom setting. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, gives a much broader definition of a disability than IDEA does. Section 504 states that a disability must substantially limit one or more basic life activities, such as learning. This is the reason why many children meet the requirements of a 504 Plan, when they do not meet eligibility for special education services.

What are the rights of parents who request a 504 plan for their child? Parents have fewer rights and safeguards in the 504 Process compared with parents who have a child on an IEP. In fact, school districts are not even required to invite parents to participate in the process. In most cases however; schools invite parents to give their input and be a part of the 504 Process. Parents do have the right to invite an educator advocate, family member, or friend to a meeting to take notes and to offer support. Parents usually prepare a written list of possible accommodations that they want to see implemented in the general education classroom. The goal of the 504 Plan meeting is to come to an agreement about specific accommodations that they think will work best for their child. The school district and parent(s) meet to discuss these accommodations, and hopefully come to an agreement on services that may help the child be successful in the general education classroom. A 504 Plan is created by a team of people who know the child and understand evaluation data and special service options. Who may be part of the 504 team? The team may include the child's parent(s), general education teachers, special education teachers, and the school principal. Depending on the situation, the school district may invite other professionals to the 504 planning meeting. At times, the school district and parent(s) may be unable to agree upon accommodations and services for the child. The school district may feel the parent's requests are not reasonable or appropriate. The school district may also feel that the services or accommodations requested by the parent(s) may be too costly or too difficult to implement in the general education classroom. If parents disagree, they may request and participate in an impartial hearing. They may also file a complaint with the school district's Section 504 coordinator. Parents have the right to examine their child's records, and be notified when their child is to be evaluated or identified with an issue.

I hope this information may be helpful to teachers and other professional educators. I do need to mention that the information in this article is based solely upon my knowledge and understanding of 504 Plans. There is so much new and relevant information out there regarding 504 Plans and the 504 Process. I encourage anyone who has interest or further questions about 504 Plans to do research and find out the facts for yourself. I hope all of you dedicated and hard-working teachers have a relaxing and fun-filled summer with family and friends!

Keep Calm, Stay Invested

Expect more volatility, but avoid letting the headlines alter your plans. Provided by Doyle D. Turner EFS Financial Advisor



Navigating Your Financial Future.



Recent headlines have disturbed what was an unusually calm stock market. The political uproar in Washington may continue for weeks or months, and it could mean significant, ongoing turbulence for Wall Street.

As an investor, a retirement saver, how much will this turmoil matter to you in the long run? Perhaps, very little. There are many good reasons to remain in the market.

The earnings recession has ended, and the economy has strengthened. This past earnings season was a superb one. The first quarter of 2017 saw the biggest annualized leap in corporate profits in five years – nearly 15%, according to S&P Capital IQ. The good news hardly ends there. We may be at or near full employment – both the headline jobless rate and the U-6 rate measuring underemployment are back to where they were before the Great Recession began. Inflation has, at last, picked up, and the manufacturing and service sectors have been growing.^{1,2}

The market is still having a good year. At this writing, the S&P 500 is up more than 5% year-to-date; the Nasdaq Composite, about 12% year-to-date. Given the economic trends mentioned in the above paragraph – and the possibility of more dovishness from the Fed – these indices could certainly see further 2017 gains.³

Remember that many investors come to regret emotional decisions. Emotions drove many people away from equities in the 2007-09 bear market, and they paid a price; after sinking to a bottom on March 9, 2009, the S&P 500 appreciated 100% in just four years. Some of those who sat on the sidelines as the bull market started ended up buying high after selling low.⁴

Here is another dramatic example: the S&P rose 15.2% in a month (in terms of total return) after hitting a low on October 9, 2002. So, just as the market can drop quickly, it can also recover quickly.⁴

Breaking news should not dissuade you from pursuing your long-term objectives. Your retirement savings effort is not momentary, but lifelong. The Dow, Nasdaq, and S&P 500 have climbed higher through all kinds of disruptions in their long history. The S&P has advanced in 72% of the years it has been in existence. Look at the big picture of market performance over time. Understand that pronounced, daily volatility is a disruption of the market norm, not the norm itself.⁴
